Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I would like to inform you about a new apostolate called Patris Corde Hermitage, which is dedicated to providing a place for silent prayer and encounter with God.

The organizers, John and Ashleigh Ryan, plan to build sixteen small, simple retreat huts on their property near Parshall, Colorado. These huts are referred to as poustinias, a word that comes from the Russian word for desert and is rooted in the Eastern Christian tradition of going to a deserted place to pray. The Hermitage grounds will also feature a small, stone chapel for the celebration of Mass and prayer.

The Ryans first experienced the beauty and depth of silent retreat at a retreat center in Minnesota called Pacem in Terris. For the last 10 years they have heard a call to establish a similar retreat center in the Archdiocese of Denver and have been encouraged in their efforts by the late Monsignor Michael Glenn, numerous other priests and lay people.

After meeting with the Ryans and reviewing their plans, I would like to offer my support as Archbishop of Denver to this effort, as it has the potential to bear great spiritual fruit in the lives of many of the faithful and clergy in our archdiocese and beyond. Patris Corde Hermitage Beginnings

We moved to Colorado from Minnesota nearly 20 years ago, and arowing up, we were both impacted by going on retreat at Pacem in Terris, a silent hermitage retreat center in Minnesota. In 2012 the Lord put in our hearts the desire to build and take care of a retreat center for priests and lay faithful in the Archdiocese of Denver, and over the years this desire was stronaly affirmed by priests that we knew and loved.

In 2017, we founded and began donating to Saint Joseph's Foundation, a non-profit organization that provides funding for the building of this hermitage retreat center. Finally in 2020, this vision was confirmed through support from Archbishop Aquila. Through the intercession of St. Joseph, we have been led to the land that will provide a place where Catholics can come retreat to encounter the love of the Father in silence and solitude.

With the help of our children and other workers, we are completing our third year of construction - John builds full time and Ashleigh supports the design and building efforts. The world desperately needs the witness of priests and laity whose lives overflow with divine intimacy. We are honored to be part of providing this place of refreshment for our priests and lay people who are pursuing union with God.



The late Monsignor Michael Glenn has been instrumental in supporting this mission, blessing the property and saying mass near the current retreat center location the day after we purchased the property in 2017. His constant encouragement to us before he passed to eternity was: "Priests need poustinia prayer." The end of this year will mark the completion of the Saint Francis and Saint Ignatius Hermitages as well as the Chapel foundation and other infrastructure, and our prayer and plan is to open this hermitage retreat center in 2023. We urgently seek your prayers for our family's protection, auidance, and faithfulness to this assignment.





"The spirituality of poustinia, or hermitage retreat, descends from the most ancient days of the Church, when Christians fled a godless world to rediscover the world of God. The lonely place, eremo in the original Greek language, is where we derive the word "hermitage" - a solitary moment of retreat from the cares of self and into the care of God. In hermitage we learn again a basic truth: solitude is not an absence, but a deeper presence . . . In a church deeply committed to the activity of the new evangelization, we need a complementary contemplation; and this requires a physical place where, heeding the words of Christ, we 'come away by yourselves to a lonely place, and rest a while' (Mk. 6:31). We may do many things for God; but we will only be fruitful if those things flow from the life of prayer. For this reason, there seems to me no more important initiative in the Archdiocese of Denver than the foundation of Patris Corde Hermitage Retreat Center."

Progress in 2022

Land Preparation

In the spring and summer of 2022, we continued clearing ground for the walking trail system.

Utilities / Infrastructure

In the summer of 2022, we completed a 400 foot drain that will support the future water pumping and treatment equipment.

Solar Power System

In the fall of this year, we completed the power building and installation of the solar system that will power the hermitages of Phase I in addition to the well and septic pumps. This system included batteries, inverter, and backup generator as well as additional gas infrastructure.

Chapel Foundation

The chapel foundation was completed in the early summer of 2022 and awaits building in 2023.

Construction of Hermitages

As of October, the first two hermitages are nearing completion, with roofing and final exterior trim in progress. The final steps will include flooring, interior trim, plumbing, and electrical. These building sites are pictured at right.

Prayer Request: Legal Process to Obtain Water

As noted in our spring newsletter, we ask you to continue praying with us as we work to complete the legal process to obtain water for the retreat center hermitages and open to the public. We began the legal process to obtain water more than a year and a half ago, and as of September 1st we have completed and submitted all requested engineering reports with the hope of completion in the next months. The water needed for these hermitages is smaller than the equivalent residential well use, but because there will be retreatants staying overnight, we are required to submit and approve a use plan in order to apply for a commercial well.

We are thankful for the experience and expertise of the legal and engineering firms that are helping us. As the opening of this retreat center is contingent upon this approval, please pray for a quick and favorable resolution!





We have been so blessed by all who have joined us in this mission of providing a place of rest, refreshment, and encounter with God for Catholic religious and lay faithful in the Archdiocese of Denver and beyond. Because of your generosity, we are completing both the Saint Francis of Assisi and the Saint Ignatius of Loyola hermitages, as well as the chapel foundation and critical Phase I solar power infrastructure.

As noted on page 7, we continue the process of obtaining our commercial well permit, which is necessary in order to open to the public. Our plan and prayer is to open Patris Corde Hermitage in August of 2023, with reservations beginning in the late Spring.

In 2023, our goal is to open Patris Corde Hermitage, complete the Chapel of Saint Joseph, and install final utilities and infrastructure prior to opening. In addition to what we have laid aside, the total needed to complete these items is \$568,846. Please consider a gift that will help us to open and to complete the chapel - an oratory dedicated to the Eucharist and to prayer for retreatants.


